

Babylon March 2026 Quarterly Update and Appendix 4C

Highlights:

- **Rental segment delivering record revenue and on track to exceed full year budget, with improving utilisation and earnings quality**
- **Net operating cash inflow of \$0.9m (+215% YoY) with \$9.5m in cash receipts (+70% YoY), reflecting increased scale and activity¹**
- **Secured extension of key pump hire contract with Talison Lithium (~\$3m p.a.), highlighting strength of Tier 1 customer relationships**
- **Completed divestment of Ausblast, simplifying the business and sharpening focus on high-margin water management rental activities**

Specialist resources services provider Babylon Pump & Power Limited (“Babylon” or “the Company”) (ASX: BPP) is pleased to present its quarterly update and cash flow report for the period ended 31 March 2026 (Q3 FY26).

The quarter reflects continued strong demand in the Company’s rental segment, with improving utilisation and earnings quality as Babylon executes its strategy to build a scaled, high-margin water management platform. Utilisation has improved to a level where the Company has selectively cross-hired in additional equipment to meet elevated demand.

Cash Flow Commentary

The Company recorded a net operating cash inflow of \$0.9 million for the March quarter (+215% from Q3 FY25), driven predominantly by increased activity in the high margin rental segment as receipts from customers reached \$9.5 million (+70% from Q3 FY25).

Operating cash flow reflects higher working capital to support increased activity across the rental business, with receivables timing aligned to higher levels of project delivery late in the quarter. These are expected to convert in the near term and are consistent with the growth trajectory of the business.

Cash at bank on 31 March 2026 was \$0.6m and undrawn finance facilities were \$3.7m.

Commenting on the results, Babylon Managing Director Michael Shelby said:

“Babylon continues to build momentum in its core rental business, with improving utilisation and strong demand across water management activities. The January holiday period is traditionally slower for site-based activity, however we are encouraged by the improvement in operational cash flow as it reflects the underlying profitability of the rental segment. The business is increasingly demonstrating the characteristics we are targeting – higher margins, more predictable earnings on increasing utilization and stronger cash generation.

“Our contract extension with long-term customer Talison Lithium underpins further confidence in the strength of the rental segment. I am proud of our team and their daily efforts to power the business forward, and as we continue to scale the platform, our focus remains on disciplined growth, operational execution and delivering long-term value for shareholders.”

Operations Update

Rental Segment

Following two key acquisitions in August 2025, Babylon's rental business is increasingly benefiting from its expanded capability and integrated service offering, allowing the Company to engage earlier in project lifecycles and capture a greater share of customer spend across water management activities.

The mix of work continues to shift toward higher-margin rental and technical services across a range of commodities, supporting improved earnings quality and reducing reliance on labour-intensive activities.

Operational integration of the Matrix and Blue Hire acquisitions continues smoothly with each business supporting and providing resources across the Group. Integration of the Matrix and Blue Hire acquisitions continues to progress well, with full financial integration expected by FY26 year end as earnout periods come to an end.

Recent rental segment activity included:

- Babylon was awarded 2 x 2-year option extensions of its contract for Mine Dewatering Services with Talison Lithium Pty Ltd. Historically the contract has delivered ~\$3.0m in annual rental revenue.
- Divested non-core Ausblast business at EBITDA multiple of ~5.6x (see ASX announcement of 21 January 2025).
- Mobilised seasonal contracted pumps for the dewatering contract for Piper Preston Pty Ltd SO4 Project.

The Company continues to see a strong pipeline of opportunities, with increasing enquiry levels from both existing and new clients, underpinning confidence in continued growth in utilisation and earnings. This momentum reinforces the Company's transition to a higher-margin, more predictable rental-led earnings profile.

Maintenance Segment

The Maintenance segment continues to operate in subdued market conditions, with activity levels broadly consistent with the first six months. The business has been right-sized to align with current demand and is operating around breakeven levels, with Q3 revenue increasing slightly to be the strongest revenue quarter of FY26 to date.

Consistent with its strategic focus on water management, the Company continues to evaluate options for a near-term exit from the Maintenance segment.

Strategy and Positioning

Babylon continues to execute its strategy of building a scaled, high-margin water management platform, with a focus on rental and technical services.

The Company's recent portfolio actions, including the divestment of non-core operations and continued investment in rental capability, are simplifying the business and enhancing its earnings profile.

This strategic focus is expected to support improved earnings predictability, stronger margins and increased returns on capital over time.

Outlook

Babylon enters Q4 FY26 with strong momentum in its Rental business, supported by improving utilisation, a growing pipeline of opportunities and favourable underlying market conditions in water management. The Company expects to deliver full year FY26 revenue of \$27-28m and underlying EBIT of approximately \$3.0m.

Key areas of focus include:

- Expanding the Rental fleet, subject to funding availability, to support contract wins and customer demand
- Maximising fleet utilisation and operational synergies across the combined group with an eye on asset rotation focusing on highest financial utilisation equipment
- Managing maintenance segment costs while evaluating long term commitment to the segment
- Financial discipline remains a priority, with continued emphasis on managing working capital, optimising fleet investment and reducing net debt

For the purpose of ASX Listing rule 4.7C.3, payments to related parties or associates of Babylon during the quarter totaled \$96k. The payments were in respect of director fees and superannuation.
